






Tōhoku earthquake and tsunami

- A magnitude 9.0 earthquake off the coast of Japan that occurred at 14:46 on 11 March 2011
- Most powerful earthquake ever to have hit Japan, and one of the five most powerful earthquakes in the world since 1900.
- Tsunami waves reached heights of up to 40.5 metres (133 ft), and travelled up to 10 km (6 mi) inland
- 15,821 deaths, 5,940 injured, and 3,929










Ishinomaki -City



- Ishinomaki is a city located in Miyagi Prefecture of Tohoku area.
- A tsunami destroyed around 80% of the 700 houses. Approximately 46% of the city was inundated by the tsunami.
- As of 17 June 2011, a total of **3,097 deaths** had been confirmed. (As of January 1, 2010, the city has an estimated population of 164,294)
- Approximately 29,000 city residents lost their homes.
